Catholic Life and Schooling Aotearoa-A History

Investigate

- Who are the significant people in your parish and/or diocese and what do they do to contribute to the mission of Jesus and the Church? (See <u>https://www.catholic.org.nz/find-us/dioceses-2/</u>).
- Which religious order founded your school and when? How is their charism lived in your school today? (See <u>https://www.catholic.org.nz/find-</u> us/organisations/#section_66)
- 3. Who did Bishop Pompallier dedicate Aotearoa to? How is that being remembered today? (See https://www.catholic.org.nz/news/media-releases/church-to-renew-mary-dedication/)
- Read about Bishop Pompallier (<u>https://www.catholic.org.nz/assets/Uploads/Bishop-Pompallier.pdf</u>) and recreate a quiz for your teachers or another class in your school.

Interview

- 1. Interview a parent, grandparent, family member, family friend, neighbour, a teacher about their experiences of Catholic education.
- 2. Arrange a *Zoom* meeting with a member of your diocesan Catholic education team or a national organisation involved with Catholic education (e.g. NZCEO, Caritas) on why they work in Catholic education.

- 1. Split the class into small groups and give each group one of the following eras:
 - 1900's 1930s
 - 1940's 1950s
 - 1960's 1980s
 - 1990's 2010s
 - Today
- 2. Students, in their groups come up with a list of what they would pack into their bag for a day a school (courtesy of the Brisbane Catholic Education Office).

A school evidence walk

- 1. What evidence can be found that this is a Catholic school?
- 2. Could a state school have the same visual art / building names / key words?
- 3. What evidence can be found of the story (the history) of this school?
- 4. Are there any artefacts / icons around the school that no one can explain their significance?
- 5. Record information to share with the whole class (courtesy of the Brisbane Catholic Education Office).

An authentic Catholic school

- 1. What is our school doing well to be an authentic Catholic school?
- 2. What opportunities do you see for our school to continue to be/ be an even stronger authentic Catholic school?
- 3. How is our school community actively continuing the mission of Jesus? (Courtesy of the Brisbane Catholic Education Office).



Catholic Schools in Aotearoa-A History

- 1. Who are the Sisters of Mercy? Where did they originate? Which were the first schools they opened in Aotearoa?
- 2. What makes your Catholic school special? View the response of students from other schools (see <u>https://www.nzceo.org.nz/catholic-schools-day/</u>) then record the viewpoints of staff and students at your school. Don't forget the caretaker!
- 3. What is Catholic Schools Day and why do we celebrate it? (<u>https://www.nzceo.org.nz/catholic-schools-day/</u>).
- 4. On a map of your diocese (or city if in Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch or Dunedin) locate the Catholic Schools.
- 5. What other schools in your diocese or in Aotearoa have the same names as your school? Investigate their websites and find similarities between some of these schools and your own.
- 6. How are your school's house names related to your school?
- 7. How are the principles of Catholic Social Teaching lived in your school community (<u>https://www.catholic.org.nz/social-action/principles/#section_117</u>).
- 8. How are the Fruits of the Holy Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23) seen in your school?
- 9. When and why did Catholic schools integrate into the state education system of Aotearoa? (https://www.nzceo.org.nz/the-story-of-state-integrated-education-video-resources/).
